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School Overview



Victoria Park Christian School is a Christ centred school community that strives to equip our students with an excellent education through a Christian world view. We want our children to experience God's love through their academic education and social interaction with their peers.

We believe that God's nature provides children with an opportunity to experience school life in a unique and inspiring way and nature is incorporated throughout our school with outdoor classrooms and nature play spaces. Nature spaces provide students with a unique outdoor environment for unstructured play and discovery, nature-based sensory experiences and exploration, which is endlessly re-inventible and sustainable.

Our small school community allows the students and teachers to be closely connected. This is an intentional and important aspect of our student leadership program which focuses on caring and supporting younger children, and fostering relationships between children of all ages. The school also has a structured buddy program that supports the children academically and socially, within and outside the classroom.

Our values program supports children to see love and respect for each other as integral to their interaction with others. Our strong multicultural community is valued and celebrated. Weekly Chapel services are a celebration of what we value and an opportunity for children to share their talents in arts and display their learning to the greater school community.



History

The School was established in 1927 as a single teacher school and was situated in McMillan Street, Victoria Park at this stage. In 1945 the school transferred to Hordern Street just around the corner from its current location. In 1963 new rooms were built on the current site of 27 Colombo Street, to cater for the Primary School while the Hordern Street site housed the High School.

During the 1980s the Junior High School outgrew the Hordern Street premises and was amalgamated with the Senior High School at Carmel.

During 2013, the school extended the Kindergarten class to include Pre-Kindergarten to cater for 3 year olds. At the same time, the Pre-Kindergarten/Kindergarten classroom operated separately to the Pre-Primary class. The Pre-Primary class moved into and operated from Room 3. The remaining three classrooms operated as multigrade classrooms. In 2014, the school operated as a Pre-Kindergarten to Year 6 school.

In 2015, the school saw its name change from Riverside Community School to Victoria Park Christian School. At this time, the Home and School made the decision to upgrade the sports uniform from its former green to the current blue and grey to match the colours of the school's new logo.



Highlights

Registration

Victoria Park Christian School went through the registration process during May of 2015. Later in the year, news was received that the school received a registration period of 4 years – this was excellent news indeed. As a result of the registration process the school was required to fix some minor issues, one of which was to replace one side of the school's fencing. This was completed and has greatly improved the look of the school.

Marketing Program – NEW NAME for School

The Health Audit, which was conducted in 2014, allowed us to gain valuable information as to how well known our school was in the broader community, which under the name of Riverside Community School, was very low.

The name Riverside Community School did not service the school well, nor did it identify with who we are and what we are seeking to do. We are a Christian school in Victoria Park serving a broad region including the Perth CBD and South Perth.

The new name identifies with where we are and who we are seeking to serve and will give us a greater opportunity to engage families to consider sending their children to their local Christian school, Victoria Park Christian School.

The name change will also enable the school to engage the local Victoria Park business and broader community that we are their local Christian School.

Our new branding will be in alignment with the national approach to Adventist Schools and has seen the introduction of new stationery, signage and proposed website.

Cricket Nets

The school was fortunate to be on the receiving end of unwanted cricket nets from Landsdale Christian School. Students in Years 4, 5 & 6 supported Mr van Moorsel in digging holes and preparing the area for the installation of the nets. Fundraising allowed the pouring of the concrete and the very arduous task of putting together the pieces of the jigsaw puzzle was left up to Mr van Moorsel and Mr Gooden – two of the school's teachers. Those students who were avid cricket fans watched and waited, offered encouragement and pushed the teachers along as they anxiously anticipated their first game of cricket.



Service

One of the many highlights of 2015 was the service project that started halfway through the year. All students from Kindy to Year 6 participated in painting A3 pieces of paper that were later made into gift bags by Year 4, 5 & 6 students. These bags were then filled with pencils, student-made Christmas tree pads, balloons, student-made playdough, colouring pages etc... The destination for these gifts was Princess Margaret Hospital – and the children who would need to stay in hospital during the Christmas period. Our 2015 prefects, went above and beyond their call of duty by returning to school, even after it had closed for the year, to deliver over 200 gift bags to Princess Margaret Hospital.

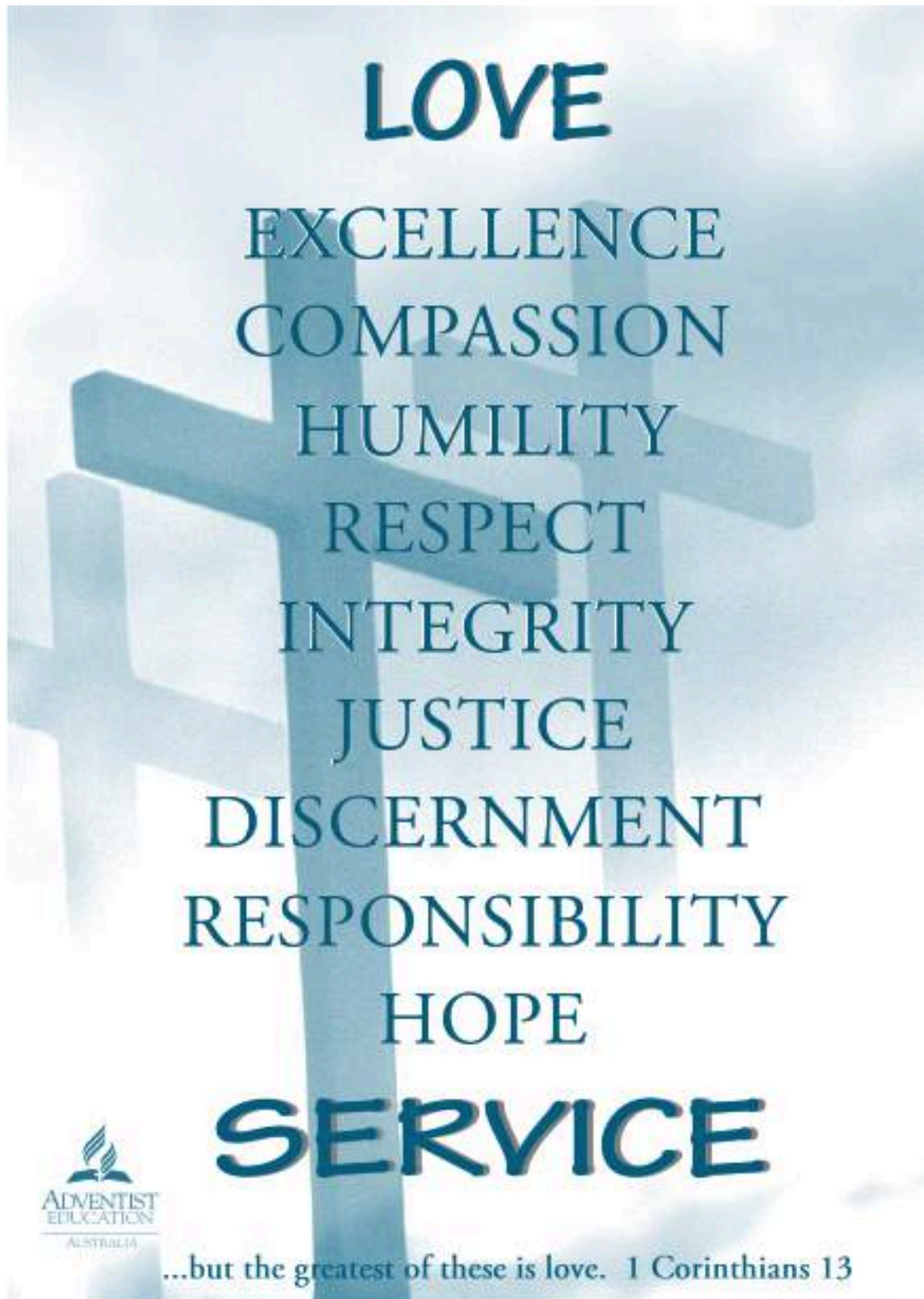

Students were also allocated to a Home Group and a teacher. The Home Groups commenced from a need to build stronger relationships between the younger and older students and to also develop leadership skills. Home Groups meet once a fortnight and participated in team building activities, service projects and games or craft activities. The students enjoyed this special time and within their groups they have built dens, decorated biscuits to give to other students, developed resilience, developed skills in being a better team player and made cards for others etc... Students are encouraged to run the home groups by discussing what activities they would like to do at each meeting.

Pastoral Care and Student Welfare

Pastor Moses Depaz (Pastor Mo) continued as Chaplain of the school in 2015, working 2.5 days per week.

Pastor Moses was able to build on the relationships that he had developed in 2014 with staff, students and families. He maintained contact with families both during and outside of school terms for prayer requests and visitations.

Pastor Moses was instrumental in his pastoral care support of students who were experiencing personal issues, and he was able to encourage them to think positively and respond appropriately in various situations by teaching them strategies in being resilient. All students appreciated the time and effort that Pastor Moses afforded them on his days at school.

Pastor Moses continued to focus on the nine Adventist Values in his weekly Chapels and classroom visits to reinforce good character and to further develop character building. Teachers also reinforced these values during their worship program and class time.
